Congress Passes Fiscal Year 2022 Funding Bills

On March 15th, the President signed the FY22 omnibus into law. The bill provides a total of \$45 billion for NIH, an increase of \$2.25 billion above FY21. In addition, the bill includes \$1.6 billion, a \$115.8 million increase over FY21, for the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA), including no less than \$345.3 million for the HEAL Initiative. Temporary Classification of Fentanyl-related Substances Extended

In addition to funding the government for the remainder of FY22, the omnibus bill included several health policy issues including an extension of the temporary classification of fentanyl-related substances in schedule 1 of the Controlled Substances Act to December 31, 2022. Read more <u>here</u>.

Tobacco Use Among Adults Continues to Decline

According to a study released by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention on March 17, an estimated 47.1 million, or 19 percent, of U.S. adults used tobacco products in 2020. The bill would require the Department of Justice to increase the number of researchers allowed to study marijuana and boost the quantity of marijuana that is produced for research.
