House Labor HHS Bill Considered in Subcommittee

On July 14, House appropriators released draft text of their FY24 Labor-HHS-Education spending bill ahead of subcommittee markup. The measure would provide \$43 billion for NIH, which is \$3.8 billion below FY23, including \$1.663 billion for NIDA, the same as the FY23 level. Read more here.

Senate Appropriators Approve FY24 Labor-HHS Spending Bill

On July 27, the Senate Appropriations Committee voted 25-1 to advance its FY24 Labor, Health and Human Services bill. The bill provides \$47.8 billion for NIH, \$943 million over FY23 and \$1.67 billion for NIDA, \$10 million over FY23 and the level included in the House FY24 bill. This includes no less than \$365.3 million, an increase of \$10 million, for the Institute's share of the HEAL Initiative. Bill text, the report, a summary and other materials are available here.
