NATHAN B. EDDY MEMORIAL AWARD



***Jack H. Mendelson, M.D., Professor of Psychiatry
Nancy K. Mello, Ph.D., Professor of Psychology
McLean Hospital/Harvard Medical School, Belmont, MA***

Jack H. Mendelson, M.D., is Professor of Psychiatry (Neuroscience) and Nancy K. Mello, Ph.D., is Professor of Psychology (Neuroscience) in the Department of Psychiatry at the Harvard Medical School. They founded and are Co-Directors of the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Research Center at McLean Hospital. Dr. Mendelson was an undergraduate at the Johns Hopkins University, and received his M.D. from the University of Maryland School of Medicine. He was an intern in Medicine at the Boston City Hospital and a resident in Psychiatry at the Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH) in Boston. He established a biochemistry laboratory at the Stanley Cobb Laboratories for Psychiatric Research at MGH to examine the neuroendocrine concomitants of alcoholism. Dr. Mello received a Ph.D. in clinical psychology at the Pennsylvania State University and then took postdoctoral training in physiology with Dr. J.L. Downer at the Harvard Medical School, and in the Experimental Analysis of Behavior with Dr. B.F. Skinner at Harvard University. Dr. Mello then joined the Stanley Cobb Laboratories for Psychiatric Research at MGH and built an operant behavior laboratory to study visual function in pigeons and color vision in cats. At MGH, Drs. Mendelson and Mello began their collaborative studies of drinking behavior in alcohol-dependent men. These were the first studies of response-contingent alcohol acquisition using operant behavioral procedures. Dr. Mendelson then became the first Chief of the National Center for Prevention and Control of Alcoholism at NIMH, NIH. This NIMH Center was the predecessor organization of the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA). In this role, Dr. Mendelson developed an intramural and extramural program of interdisciplinary research on alcoholism and promoted the concept that alcoholism was a chronic medical disease. Dr. Mello directed the first Intramural Research Program of the NIMH National Center for Prevention and Control of Alcoholism and also served as a Research Consultant to the Special Action Office for Drug Abuse Prevention of the Executive Office of the President.

Dr. Mendelson then returned to Harvard Medical School as Professor and Chief of the Department of Psychiatry at the Boston City Hospital where he continued research on alcoholism and began studies of marijuana. Dr. Mello subsequently returned to Harvard Medical School to marry Dr. Mendelson, and together they founded the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Research Center at McLean Hospital. Today, the Center has research programs in Behavioral Science, Neuroendocrinology, Medicinal Chemistry, Pharmacology, Neurobiology, Neuroscience and Brain Imaging. Drs. Mello and Mendelson have long been interested in the identification and evaluation of new medications for the treatment of cocaine and opioid abuse. They conducted the first clinical laboratory studies showing that buprenorphine significantly reduced heroin self-administration by heroin-dependent men. They also found that buprenorphine significantly reduced cocaine self-administration as well as concurrent heroin + cocaine "speedball" self-administration in nonhuman primates. In addition, Drs. Mendelson and Mello are currently studying the interactions between abused substances and the hormonal milieu. They found that the rapid hormonal changes and subjective effects induced by cocaine and nicotine are very similar, and they are exploring the influence of hypothalamic-pituitary-adrenal and gonadal hormones on the reinforcing effects of these drugs. A better understanding of the hormonal correlates of the abuse-related effects of drugs may eventually suggest new approaches to treatment. Dr. Mendelson has published over 450 scientific papers, and Dr. Mello has published over 350 scientific papers, and they have edited 11 books and monographs. They edited the Journal of Studies of Alcohol (1984-1991) and Dr. Mello is currently Editor of Experimental and Clinical Psychopharmacology. Drs. Mendelson and Mello have received a number of honorific awards for their research including the Jellinek Award for Research in Alcoholism, and the Distinguished Research Award from the Research Society on Alcoholism. Dr. Mendelson received the Hofheimer Prize from the American Psychiatric Association and the Founders Award from AAPAA. Dr. Mello has received the AMERSA Betty Ford Award, the CPDD Marian W. Fischman Memorial Award, and the APA Division 28 Brady-Schuster Award. Drs. Mendelson and Mello have served on the CPDD Board of Directors and, since 1985, on the Nominating Committee for the Nobel Prize for Physiology and Medicine.

MENTORSHIP AWARD



Scott Lukas, Ph.D.

***Director, Behavioral Psychopharmacology
McLean Hospital/Harvard Medical School, Belmont, MA***

Dr. Lukas received his Ph.D. in pharmacology and toxicology in 1979 from the University of Maryland. He then spent three years as a postdoctoral fellow at Johns Hopkins University and another 18 months at the National Institute on Drug Abuse's Addiction Research Center before coming to McLean Hospital and Harvard Medical School in 1984. He currently directs both the Behavioral Psychopharmacology Research Laboratory (in the NeuroImaging Center) and the Sleep Research Program. He has been conducting clinical electrophysiological and psychopharmacological studies for the past 25 years. He has focused on using EEG topographic brain mapping, polysomnography, and a variety of brain imaging (MRI/fMRI/MRS) techniques to quantify the changes in brain function that parallel altered states of consciousness, sleep, performance, mood states and reinforcement after psychoactive drug administration or presentation of drug-related cues in adults and adolescents. These areas of research serve as a rich opportunity for his students and mentorees to build on their own careers in drug abuse research. He has received continuous NIH funding since 1984 and is currently the Director of a NIDA T32 Training Grant. Over the years he has trained many fellows and KO1/K23/K25 awardees and currently mentors 4 postdoctoral and 4 K-level awardees. He has held a NIDA KO5 Senior Scientist Award for nearly 10 years and held a KO2 Award for the 10 years prior to that. He has served on the Board of Directors and chaired the Program Committee of the College on Problems of Drug Dependence; he is a regular presenter for the NIDA Grant Writing Workshop held each year at the annual CPDD meeting. Dr. Lukas recently stepped down as chair of McLean's Institutional Review Board and currently chairs the NIDA-K study section that reviews all training and career development awards.

Sheila Nevins

***Executive Producer, Addiction
President, HBO Documentary Films***

Sheila Nevins is President, HBO Documentary Films for Home Box Office, responsible for overseeing the development and production of all documentaries and family programming for HBO and Cinemax and their multiplex channels. During her tenure, HBO's critically acclaimed documentary and family programs have won numerous awards. She has received 17 Prime Time Emmy® Awards, 24 News and Documentary Emmys® and 25 George Foster Peabody Awards. Nevins has been honored with several career achievement awards, including a 2005 Emmy® Lifetime Achievement Award for her contributions to the art of the documentary, the first time the National Television Academy has awarded Lifetime Achievement recognition to a documentarian. She received a Lucy Award from Women In Film for her outstanding achievements in advancing documentary filmmaking; the Humanitarian Award from the National Board of Review for her contribution to the advancement of social reforms and the promotion of human welfare through film; the Tribute to the Human Spirit Award from the Wellness Community of West Los Angeles for her contribution to the education and inspiration of cancer patients and their families; and the Doubletake Documentary Film Festival's first Industry Award. Nevins was inducted into Broadcasting & Cable's Hall of Fame and NATAS' Silver Circle and in 1999 received a Personal Peabody in recognition of her work and ongoing commitment to excellence. For the past 3 consecutive years, she was named one of The Hollywood Reporter's Top 50 Women in Hollywood. Nevins is a member of the Writers Guild of America, the Producers Guild of America, is on the Board of Creative Capital, Full Frame Film Festival at Duke, the Independent Feature Project and The Film Forum. She holds a B.A. from Barnard College and an MFA from Yale University School of Drama.

John Hoffman

John Hoffman is Vice President, HBO Documentary Films, for Home Box Office, responsible for overseeing the development and production of various HBO Documentary Films. He was named to this position in June 2006. An award-winning television producer, Hoffman has been associated with HBO for the past ten years, having spearheaded some of the network's most noteworthy and critically acclaimed documentaries as an independent producer. Hoffman's HBO credits include: *Addiction* (producer, 2007), a 14-part series and multi-platform initiative, *All Aboard! Rosie's Family Cruise* (producer, 2006); Emmy® nominee *Last Letters Home: Voices of American Troops from the Battlefields of Iraq* (executive producer, 2005); Academy Award® nominee *My Architect* (supervising producer, 2004); Emmy® and Dupont-Columbia Award-winner *In Memoriam, New York City, 9/11/01* (producer, 2002), Academy Award® nominee *Lalee's Kin: The Legacy of Cotton* (supervising producer, 2001); Sundance and Berlin Film Festival Award-winner *Paragraph 175* (supervising producer, 2001); Emmy®-winner *Children in War* (supervising producer, 2000); Emmy®-nominee *Cancer: Evolution to Revolution* (supervising producer, 2000), Emmy® and Academy Award® winner *One Day in September* (supervising producer, 2000); Prior to HBO, Hoffman created and produced the award-winning Nickelodeon series *Allegra's Window* from 1993-96, was a producer at Children's Television Workshop in 1993, and from 1990-92 was the administrative director of the Center for Special Studies at New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center. He also co-founded the non-profit production company AIDSFILMS, dedicated to HIV education. As the executive director from 1987-90, he raised funds and produced six multi-award winning documentaries, including the PBS special *AIDS: Changing the Rules*. He is a graduate of Cornell University.

A four-time Emmy Award winner, Ms. Froemke won a 2001 Grammy for her work as director and producer on *Recording the Producers: A Musical Romp with Mel Brooks*. Ellen B. Geller, M.A.

***Scientific Coordinator, Center for Substance Abuse Research
Executive Assistant, College on Problems of Drug Dependence
Temple University School of Medicine, Philadelphia, PA***

Ellen B. Geller received her B.A. in biology from Temple University in 1972 and her M.A. in 1974. She did her graduate research in the area of circadian rhythms in the Psychobiology Program at Temple. Since 1974, she has been working with Dr. Martin Adler at the Temple University School of Medicine, primarily on the effects of morphine and endorphins on opioid receptors. Ms. Geller became Laboratory Supervisor in 1988 and has been the Scientific Coordinator for the Center for Substance Abuse Research since 1998. She is a co-investigator on the NIDA grants “Center on Intersystem Regulation by Drugs of Abuse” and “Opioids, Cannabinoids, Chemokines: Functional Implications”. Among the research areas of greatest interest to her are body temperature regulation, analgesia, and, more recently, interactions between the opioid, cannabinoid and immune systems. Ms. Geller has been a member of the College on Problems of Drug Dependence since 1992 and has served as the Executive Assistant of the organization since 1986. She is a member of the Program (1990-present) and the Electronic Communications (2000-present) Committees of CPDD and has been involved with the meeting arrangements since 1979. In addition to CPDD, Ms. Geller is a member of the Society for Neuroscience, the American Society for Pharmacology and Experimental Therapeutics, the International Narcotics Research Conference, the International Cannabinoid Research Society, the Society on NeuroImmune Pharmacology and Sigma Xi. She has authored or co-authored approximately 95 publications and is an Associate Editor of *Factors Affecting the Actions of Narcotics*.

JOSEPH COCHIN YOUNG INVESTIGATOR AWARD



Nancy M. Petry, Ph.D.

***Professor of Psychiatry
University of Connecticut School of Medicine,
Farmington, CT***

Nancy Petry earned a Ph.D. in psychology from Harvard University in 1994, and completed postdoctoral training at the University of Vermont. In 1996, she joined the faculty of the University of Connecticut Health Center, where she is Professor of Psychiatry. She conducts research on the treatment of addictive disorders, ranging from substance use disorders to pathological gambling, and has published over 130 peer-reviewed articles and a book on the treatment of pathological gambling. Her work is funded by the National Institute on Drug Abuse, the National Institute of Mental Health, and the National Institutes on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism. Dr. Petry serves as a consultant and advisor for the National Institute of Health, and she is on the editorial boards of six academic journals. She received the American Psychological Association Distinguished Scientific Award for Early Career Contributions to Psychology in 2003.
